## Blue Ribbon Campaign to raise awareness of child abuse

BRISTOL — Those blue ribbons vou're seeing around town aren't just a colorful way to welcome the spring weather.

The Parent and Child Center at Bristol Hospital, in partnership with the Bristol Exchange Club, is hosting its annual Blue Ribbon Campaign to raise awareness of, and money to help fight, child abuse. The fundraiser is always held in April, which is National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

"The blue in the ribbons represents the bruises of kids who have been abused," said Beverly Foote, chairwoman of the center's advisory board.

"It is a big issue in the community," said Kimberly Carmelich, director of the Parent and Child Center. "Bristol has a much higher rate of child abuse than surrounding towns. It's sometimes a hidden issue that people don't talk about."

According to data provided by the state Department of Children and Families, Bristol accounted for 1,695 allegations of child abuse or neglect in the 2012-13 fiscal year; substantiated.

Those numbers eclipse those (860) 585-3481.

of surrounding towns, including Plainville (275 reported, 25 substantiated), Southington (522, 61) and Farmington (152, 34) over the same period.


"We're here to help," Carmelich said. "We offer over 100 parenting classes a year on various issues, anywhere from how to communicate with your child and how to discipline your them to how to deal with your child's anger."

All the funds raised during the campaign will go to educational programs that look to reduce child

Another way the center supports the cause is by offering The Caring Closet, which provides low-income families with their infants' and young children's basic needs, including diapers, baby food and clothing. All are supplied through community donations.

"Often times child abuse comes about because of stress," Carmelich said. "If you can imagine not being able to meet your child's needs, it can create additional stress that leads to abuse. The Caring Closet just tries to ease the burden.'
